

Are you the sole or fulltime carer for someone in your family, or a friend? Many people who are looking after ailing spouses, children, relatives, parents or friends don't actually call themselves carers. Are you aware that as a carer you are entitled to financial and practical support?

The Royal Commission into Aged Care, whose finding's were delivered in March 2021, recommended that people who fall into this category – unacknowledged even by themselves as carers – be accounted for and funded. The Carer Gateway was established as a result of the ongoing unmet needs of carers, who experience twice the rate of ill physical and mental health of the general population.

Eleven percent of the population currently cares for someone who is aged, ill, has a disability or mental illness, and there is some funding available to support unpaid carers. However, finding them is one challenge; and identifying what support they need, and then helping to supply it, is another.

Vivien Philpotts and Michelle Balthazar from the

Lancefield and Romsey Neighbourhood Houses are keen to talk with carers so that the carers in turn can be cared for, with time out, home help, whatever they identify as areas of need. Maybe someone coming in to chop firewood, clean the garden, rearrange the cupboards; maybe an outing with the cared-for person?

Previously, local and regional health care services provided some of this sort of assistance. However, the Shire dropped its Home Care program, and Meals on Wheels no longer operates. And there are no case managers in the NDIS – the carers have to fulfil that role, with paperwork, signing disclaimers and keeping up with documentary requirements – if the carer is caring for more than one person, this is a huge burden in time and stress.

Previously gestures towards carers have been wellintentioned but insufficient – a few morning teas to get a carer out of the house and socialising is a kind gesture,

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
ANZAC DAY SERVICE



Marchers are requested to assemble in front of the Lancefield Hotel, in High Street, at 9:15am.


After the service, tea and coffee will be provided by the Lancefield Neighbourhood House committee in the Lancefield Mechanics Hall.

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PROJECT CULTIVATE

Cemeteries vary...sometimes neat and well-trimmed but often weedy and unkempt. Neat and well-trimmed is expensive; requiring a lot of trimming, weeding, poisoning and mowing, hence, the idea behind Project Cultivate. I first heard about the project from Kosta on ABC Radio and he was excited...even for Kosta!

Project Cultivate involves planting native plants and grasses local to the area to revitalise cemetery sites while complementing surrounding monuments, pathways and facilities. Carried out in consultation with stakeholders including families, the local community and Traditional Owners, the project is succeeding in establishing a beautiful biodiverse environment that can be sustainably maintained.

An exploratory pilot at Melbourne General Cemetery commenced in May 2023 with the laying of 1,400 cubic metres of mulch. This was followed by the planting of more than 120,000 indigenous native grasses, wildflowers and groundcovers, which was completed in November 2023. These works have benefited the cemetery in many ways, including:

- 30% reduction in herbicide use across the site
- 3°C reduction in ambient air temperature around mulched areas
- Improved soil quality and reduction in erosion, runoff and water pooling
- Visible increases in biodiversity, including increased activity from beneficial native insects, worms, fungi and birds.

Last year, at our place, we carried out our own mini version of Project Cultivate in three areas covering a total of 180 m2. To avoid using poison we covered the areas in overlapping cardboard and newspapers, topped it with freely available mulch and planted with grasses and shrubs sourced from our Landcare group, local nurseries and the Lancefield Farmers' Market. At cemeteries, space between graves is often tight, but in our case, we could choose from a broader range of plants enabling us to also include grevilleas,



correas, bursarias, tea-trees, mint bushes as well as smaller banksias, bottle brushes and wattles. We have watered them this summer, but they are drought tolerant once established. The areas are low maintenance and are starting to look pretty good.

After the success of this first pilot phase at the Melbourne General Cemetery (MGC), mulching has now been carried out in a second area in preparation to plant an additional 150,000 indigenous plants. The Southern Metropolitan Cemeteries Trust (SMCT) plans on mulching and planting the remaining 41% of suitable areas from July 2024, with completion by June 2025. The Project Cultivate pilot program at the MGC has developed a blueprint for similar environmental projects at other cemetery locations.

Visitors can continue to access the Melbourne General Cemetery. Opened in 1853, the historical and iconic Cemetery is regarded as one of Australia's most important. It was the first cemetery in Victoria to be designed as a public park, with curved pathways, trees and shrubs, gate lodges and rest pavilions. Before the MGC site was used as a cemetery, the area was likely a grassy woodland dominated by river red gums and diverse indigenous grasses, herbs, forbs and wildflowers, with Kangaroo Grass (Themeda triandra) making up most of the understory.

While the landscape and gardens of the Cemetery have changed dramatically since opening to the public, many traditional elements and plantings remain today including significant native and exotic trees, ornamental rose gardens and areas of lush, green turf. While these traditional plantings have their place, new plantings must consider broader environmental and sustainability factors. The SMCT CEO Laz Cotsios said listening to Traditional Owners and understanding the types of flora that existed in the area pre-colonisation was critical to inform the project. "We're listening to what the land needs. We're working with our neighbours, our colleagues, with Traditional Owners and with community to explore what could be and how we can re-imagine a more sustainable future together," Mr Cotsios said. "We can't start again, but we can bring back some of the plants and hardy foliage that came before us."

There is also a lack of irrigation at MGC, and the soil is heavy compacted clay, with little topsoil. SMCT horticulturists, in consultation with industry experts, local government and Traditional Owners have developed a list of 16 indigenous plants for Project Cultivate, many of which would have previously been present at the site. These plants are climate ready and will thrive at the site, tolerating the challenging soil and lack of irrigation. The list includes Kangaroo Grass, Wallaby Grass, Native Flax, Tufted Bluebell, Clustered Everlastings and Billy Buttons.

Like Kosta, I am excited by the project. Not just its potential for cemeteries but for other public land and our backyards!

Deep Creek Landcare Group has nesting boxes for bats, birds and phascogales for sale from \$30. We also have Myna bird traps to lend out. Annual Landcare membership is \$20 per family. 



Husk and Harvest return also with new seasons walnuts grown at Redesdale. The walnuts are graded and vacuum sealed for freshness through the year.

Every one of their fruit cakes is delicately handcrafted and laden with dried fruits from the Sunraysia District. 



The biennial Botanic Art exhibition, ARTANICA, showcasing the remarkable talent of the Mt Macedon and District Horticultural Society's botanic artists, will be held on April 13 -28, at the Mt Macedon Horticultural Hall, Mt Macedon Golf Club, Mt Macedon.

For over a decade the Society has been supporting an active group of talented artists many who exhibit both nationally and internationally. The group include artists who regularly exhibit in major exhibitions at both the Royal Botanic Gardens Melbourne and Sydney, as well as members who have exhibited works in major international institutions such as the Hunt Institute, USA, and the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew, London.

These artists are continuing this tradition while adopting a contemporary approach and style, and a wish to capture the bio-diversity of plants found in both the natural landscape and historic gardens.



EMRBATA

EMRBATA was successful in obtaining State Government funding to support the development of Town Centre Activation Plans for Romsey and Lancefield. Workshops have been organised by EMRBATA to be held on 16 April (Romsey) and 18 April (Lancefield). These will engage business operators, shopfront landlords and community leaders to work with renowned "place-makers", Village Well (www.villagewell.org), to identify quick wins and do-able projects as well as some bigger moves that will rejuvenate and reinvigorate the town centre (Main/High Street) precincts of Romsey and Lancefield.

This is part of the Macedon Ranges Thriving Villages Project, funded by State Government. Romsey and Lancefield are, so far, the only towns which have secured funding for specific Town Centre Activation Plans, although a "Macedon Ranges Regional Vision" discussion (engaging representatives from towns/villages across the Shire) was held in March.

Macedon Ranges Shire Council is strongly supporting the project and will attend the discussions in an observer capacity. This is a project being driven by the community for the community. It will yield benefits for local businesses and the broader community. It aims to forge a new culture when it comes to effective collaboration between community, Council and other stakeholders to "get things done".



CHRISTMAS

As a result of State Government COVID 19 Recovery funding made available to Business and Traders Groups, RRBATA/ EMRBATA initiated the Romsey Main Street Illuminations element of Christmas in Romsey which were held in 2021 and 2022. With the addition of an evening craft market, the Main Street Illuminations attracted visitors to the town and engaged many local community members in a relaxed, family friendly setting. Unfortunately, this funding stream was no longer available last year so the Illuminations element did not feature in the Christmas in Romsey 2023 program.

FORCE OF NATURE RETURNS




Thanks also to Holgate's Brewery for hosting our lunch this month and for providing a seniors' range of meals as options. It was much appreciated.

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ROMSEY HOTEL SUBMISSION

Romsey residents – and those living within five kilometres of the Romsey Hotel – are invited to complete a survey relating to an application for gaming machines, to help inform Council's submission to the Victorian Gambling and Casino Control Commission (VGCCC).

In response to an application to the VGCCC for 50 gaming machines at 90 Main Street in Romsey

(Romsey Hotel), Council has commissioned an independent consultant to deliver a Social and

Economic Impact Assessment (SEIA). To inform this SEIA, Council is undertaking a community survey via independent company Insync, using a publicly available database from the Victorian Electoral Commission to target letterbox drops to all Romsey residents and those within five kilometres of the venue.

Council's Director Community, Maria Weiss, said there may be people who have moved to the area

more recently – or turned 18 and are newly eligible to vote – who are not captured in this database.

"We know this is an important matter for many Romsey

REPORT DUMPED TYRES

Tired of seeing tyres dumped in our parks and waterways? These illegal dumps aren't just eyesores – they pose serious fire risk, provide a breeding ground for vermin and cost a lot to clean up. Remember you pay for the legal disposal of your waste tyres when you buy new ones. Don't let others destroy residents and we want to ensure that we are

giving as many eligible people (within five kilometres of the venue) as possible the opportunity to

participate in our survey," she said. "It is important to Council that our SEIA is as well-informed as it can be, to ensure that our submission to the VGCCC best represents the sentiments of our community."

Eligible residents who haven't received a letter directly must "opt in" to complete the survey, showing proof of residency to ensure validity of the data collected. Residents can do this by contacting Council on 5422 0333, or by visiting a Council office in person.


A summary of results will be included in a future Council report, expected to be listed for decision at the April 2024 Council Meeting.



SKIN CANCER UNIT TO VISIT WOODEND

Australia has one of the highest rates of skin cancer in the world and Lions Clubs in Victoria and Southern NSW are doing something practical about reducing that level and its impact on families. The incorporated charity, the Lions V Districts Cancer Foundation, has put a Skin Check and Awareness Unit on the road. The Lions Club of Lancefield-Romsey are proud to announce that the skin van will be visiting Woodend, stationed at Marjory Place near the visitor centre on Saturday 20 and Sunday 21 April.

The van will provide a free skin checking service to local people and will be operated by fully trained, certificated and professionally supervised volunteers. The unit will also be a valuable resource for local people to access not only the skin check, but valuable and timely information about skin care and self-checking techniques. We know early detection of skin lesions potentially saves lives, so this visit will be a timely support and reminder to local people of the need to take care of their skin. Following the skin check, visitors will be issued with a referral to their GP if there are any suspect spots or lesions. The Unit is not a medical clinic, so diagnosis or treatment requirements are not discussed – it simply provides the skin check and alerts the visitor to skin lesions that require further checking and attention: a great first step in ensuring urgent needs are addressed.

but hardly solid ongoing support. And if a carer can't even make it to the morning tea – often due to lack of backup to stay with the person cared for - it makes the idea even more disappointing.

PS My Family Matters (https://www.psmfm.org.au/) was started by Tamara Wilson ten years ago; she needed support herself and recognised that she was one of many people in the same position. These days she is a peer support consultant for the group, led by a team of volunteer board members who are either carers or work in the community sector. The organisation has some federal government funding until the end of June this year, so has teamed up with local Neighbourhood Houses to try and find a more sustainable model.

Isolation is one of the main issues for carers. Often the carer is left with the whole burden of care when other family members, or friends, leave them to it. Rates of separation, domestic violence and poverty are particularly high in the carer community. So mental health suffers, too. Some carers are holding down fulltime jobs, then they come home to their carer roles in between employment. Carers have double the rate of physical and mental issues – no wonder. And they are primarily women who have had to sacrifice their own physical, mental, social and financial wellbeing in order to meet their caring obligations. (2023 Carer Wellbeing Survey Report – Carers Australia and University of Canberra).

There are 420 Neighbourhood and Community Houses and Centres in Victoria: "More of us than Maccas!" says


Kristine Rawlinson, President of PS My Family Matters, Project Manager-Carers with Neighbourhood Houses Victoria, and carer to both her husband and son. Since partnering with local Neighbourhood Houses, PSMFM is now supporting four times the number of carers and families. Originally it was seven carers in the Macedon Ranges who were receiving intensive support. Now it's 32, and the numbers keep growing, bearing in mind that the ripple effect takes in extended family members and friends, and amounts to more like 100 people who benefit from the support.

Donations are what keep PSMFM afloat, and they deal with each person's situation individually – there's no paperwork for carers (PSMFM make this all happen in the background), which is a big plus, since, as we all know, dealing with any government department is a maze of form filling-in, which takes time, and often funding doesn't apply unless there's a "crisis". Also, PSMFM can respond quickly to requests for support; they are local, on the ground and not bound by bureaucracy.

There's peer support, perhaps a shoulder to cry on and regular get-togethers for pizza with carers and their loved ones socialising together, a rare event for many.

This idea is one Vivien and Michelle and Kristine, with PSMFM, want to expand, to reduce the isolation factor and offer welcoming Neighbourhood Houses, for all involved.

Vivien and Michelle would like to create a list of local carers – not to be shared publicly, but for reference when applying for funding. Since there is a pool of funding

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available, Vivien and Michelle will collate the list of needs, and advocate on behalf of carers. This list of carers will be kept private in the Neighbourhood House files.

They are suggesting a directory list, so that any need, whether it's chopping wood, shopping, giving emotional support with a cuppa and a chat, or keeping the cared for person company in their own home whilst the carer takes time out, can be flagged and addressed – Vivien and Michelle want to know what carers need, so that this can be taken into consideration when making a directory of needs and helpers, and funding levels. Sometimes it may be as simple as getting someone to come and help with gardening, small domestic chores, or clean out cupboards, drive to appointments (and wait to return home, which is a time commitment). The helpers on the list may be busy people with a small window of time and a good chopping arm, or...name any other skill.

There will be a paid part-time coordinator to collate, assess and communicate under the Neighbourhood House umbrella, similar to Tamara's peer support work for PSMFM. Info will be passed on to agencies who offer specific services, if that applies. As many of the current supports respond to carer burnout and poor wellbeing, rather than prevention, the idea is to "Invest early, save lives" rather than patch up after the event.

This fits in with Neighbourhood Houses Victoria's aim to have ongoing funding across the State's neighbourhood and community houses and centres to establish Neighbourhood Carers Clubs. These would be co-located with houses like Romsey and Lancefield Neighbourhood Houses and would receive funding to employ a part-time peer support worker and fund activities and a range of supports for carers to participate in; whether the activities are carer specific or general community offerings is totally up to the individual carer.

Carers need to know that there is somewhere in their local community – that it's not one of the many medical or disability related organisations they always deal with - where they are always welcome; where someone understands what it is they are going through and they can relieve the carer of some of their mental load, and work with the carer to improve their mental, physical, social and financial wellbeing.

Ideas for support are welcome – lunches for carers, and cared-for. Neighbourhood Houses are carer-friendly places. Come in and chat with your thoughts about how best you can be assisted.

The monthly Feed it Forward lunch in April will have a Carers theme and is free for any Carer or the person/people they care for. In April the lunch will be held in Romsey on Wednesday 24 at 12.30pm.
